
So, drive the Triumphs to 32 Coffee House 10626 North 32<sup>nd</sup> Street.

## **Technical Corner**

# Will those TR8/TR7 wheel rims fit my GT6/Spitfire? By Armand LaCasse

Possibly... First the good news. These wheel rims share the same bolt circle of 3.75 inches. And the wheel offsets are similar. (Google "wheel offset explained" if you want to know more.)

Offset refers to how your car's or truck's wheels and tires are mounted and sit in the wheel wells. Zero-wheel offset is when the hub mounting surface is in line with the centerline of the wheel. Positive wheel offset is when the hub mounting surface is in front (more toward the street side) of the centerline of the wheel.

Spitfire and GT6 can accommodate wheel rims (with appropriate offset and tires) that are six inches wide. Later stock Spitfire and GT6 wheel rims are 4.5 inches wide – look for the 4.5 X 13 X 88 stamped in the rim face. Some later Spitfires even had 5-inch-wide steel rims. The period-correct Appliance slotted mag wheels I have used for years are 5.5 inches wide. TR8 and TR7 factory alloy wheels (part# RKC2111 cast in the wheel) are 5.5 inches wide. All of these are 13-inch diameter rims.

CAUTION: You will probably need to roll the bonnet inner wheel arch seam up to provide wider tire sidewall clearance at the top of the tire. Otherwise, that sharp wheel arch edge acts like a knife slicing your tire sidewall every time you go over a bump or make a turn. Likewise check your rear wheel arch opening. A hard plastic or rubber mallet and 15 minutes of careful hammering is all it takes to roll the sharp edges upward.

## **Technical Corner (cont.)**

I want to thank Steve for the aftermarket TR8 alloy rims that I thought would look great on my GT6+. The rims are Australian made Superlite (Minilite / Panasport style) eight spoke 14 x 6 JJ wheels with 185/50 R 14 tires. The wheel rims did not include any lug nuts. This was the start of figuring out how to 'just bolt these wheels on'...



But how are you going to hold those TR8 rims to the GT6 wheel studs? GT6 and Spitfire both have (little) 3/8-24 thread wheel studs. I believe the TR7 originally had 7/16-20 thread wheel studs. These were soon replaced by similar size 12MM wheel studs that are also on the TR8.

Some more good news – if you just want to change the wheel studs. The original 3/8-inch wheel studs and the 12MM wheel studs have the same size serrated shank. So just press out the smaller diameter wheel studs and press in the larger size studs so you can use the larger lug nuts. However, I wanted to retain the original 3/8-inch wheel studs for the Appliance slotted mag wheels.



So, what really holds a wheel rim to the hub? The lug nuts we are most accustomed to are conical/tapered at about a 30-degree angle on one nut face. The taper also allows the lug nut to center the wheel lug hole about the wheel stud.

The Appliance mag wheels, and the TR8 factory alloy wheels use a less common flat seat with a washer under the lug nut head. These lug nuts have a shoulder that locates the wheel rim flange hole about the wheel stud.

The Superlite wheels have a conical/tapered 30-degree steel clamping surface inside the wheel flange lug nut hole. The wheel flange is one- and one-quarter inches thick. To determine the lug nut hole shape, I packed plumber's putty inside the lug nut hole and then removed the molded putty from the hole. Then I measured the various hole dimensions. Time to find some 3/8 lug nuts to fit the hole shape.

## **Technical Corner (cont.)**

Twenty-five years ago, and after 2+ years of telling everyone about my search for Appliance lug nuts, Glen pointed me towards a repair shop where he saw new old stock (NOS) packaged Appliance slotted mag wheel lug nuts. I gladly paid \$20 for these 16 chrome beauties. Today we have the internet. I tried Google for the appropriate shape and size lug nuts and found nothing that would work without further machining.

I found what I needed in my own parts bins. The later stock Spitfire and GT6 wheel lug nuts are one- and one-half inches long. They retain a plastic washer to hold the spring-loaded center cap over the wheel center. They have enough material in the right places to be turned on the lathe and produce the short sleeved 30-degree taper lug nuts I need. The lug nut picture shows the difference between the stock lug nut, and the machined lug nut shoulder with the taper leading to the 11/16 hex.

In the wheel picture you can see the machined lug nuts are almost flush with the wheel flange. A half-inch drive socket only needed .030 turned off of its outside diameter to fit inside the lug nut hole. And Pete says the car looks great with these wheels!



2020 has been a difficult year to meet in person, socialize, and create the "Triumph-people connections" that support belonging to DCTRA.

The DCTRA Executive Leadership Team met on Saturday, October 24. 2020, at Surprise Community Park after the Bring Your Own Brunch - Off to the Races Drive to consider a proposal for unusual action. President John Heisser, Vice President John Nuss, Secretary Mary White, and Treasurer Armand LaCasse discussed 2021 membership dues and unanimously agreed:

- DCTRA will not collect any membership renewal dues in 2021.
- Every member as of December 31, 2020 will have one year of membership added to their membership expiration date.

If your membership would have expired in 2021, now it will expire in 2022. 2022 membership expirations move to 2023. And 2023 membership expirations move to 2024.

**How much will this cost?** Our membership dues income average is \$1800 per year. We estimate a one-year membership renewal extension would be a loss of \$1600 in membership renewal income in 2021. We expect some new members will join during the 2021 year and the usual membership renewal periods would apply.

#### **Cruise to Globe**

January 8, 2021 - A nice 170-mile cruise

Friday was a rather good day for a Triumph drive. It started with a text from Craig Kenyon, TR6, saying that he and Mike Goodwin, XKE Jag, were planning on taking a drive out east culminating with a stop for lunch at the Famous Burger House ... think massive Chili Burgers. Arizona has some wonderful roads to tour, and they are great for sporty cars.

We met at the Chevron Station at Rte. 60 and Idaho in Apache Junction for quick access to the route put together by Craig, starting on Rte. 60 east to Rte.177 southeast. Traveling through mining country, the road was good, with some brake riding and 10% grades. The views were great of the copper mining in the mountains, and the colors were amazing. At Winkelman, we headed east through town where we picked up Rte.77 heading north, toward Globe. While heading to Globe, I noticed a sweet smell in our TR6. I had a bottle of hand sanitizer in my pocket and thought it had somehow leaked. I checked my pocket it wasn't that. Then I thought my wife, Linda had put on some perfume, but she's not a perfume person. I quit thinking about it as the smell dissipated. I'm a gauge watcher and didn't notice anything going on under the hood. The car had been running a little ragged during the trip, and I attributed it to just not

We ate lunch leisurely and let the car cool down. It took only a few minutes for Craig, who did most of the work, and me to swap out the old one and put in the new one. Mike had some 50/50 antifreeze mix - I owe him for that. Luckily, with the valve on top of the engine, not a lot of coolant had leaked out. While putting the tools away, I did a quick inspection and found the reason for the ragged running I had noticed during the drive. The choke cable on the back Stromberg had broken. It was an original from '76. The carb was running rich the whole trip. I closed the choke and drove home without incident in a smooth and cool running TR6.





When I got home, I went online with Amazon and ordered a Four Seasons, (not to be confused with the landscape company) #74648 Heater Control Valve and a 5/8 to 1/2 in. hose adapter. This, like all things in life, should be the last heater control valve on the car, but I will carefully clean the valve that's on the car now and return it to the Tool/Parts bag, because you never know. I also ordered a new, not cheap, choke cable assembly from Moss. Everything is coming in a few days, and I'll be back on the road ready for another run.




